Q&A Jeet Kune Do

Fighting Fit's John Dennen talks to Lak Loi about Bruce Lee's combat philosophy and finds out that it's based around stand-up street fighting, effective moves focused on speed and power, and simplicity and directness.

Would you say it's a forerunner of MMA?

You can't take the best bits of a Ferrari and the best bits of a Porsche and put them together to create a hypercar. The parts weren't designed to work together. In terms of Bruce studying different martial arts, their structures don't work together. The Jeet Kune Do structure is one that is optimised for speed and mobility, while you're standing up.

Can JKD help combat sportsmen?

Absolutely yes, because it is predominately a set of principles and philosophies. If you can develop your techniques within the principles and philosophies then you will make what you have more effective as a fighter.


Are there JKD competitions or do JKD practioners fight in other combat sports?

Pure JKD cannot be used in the ring. But Jeet Kune Do is a thinker's art. There's a lot of techniques that can be applied in competition fighting to give you an edge. There are a couple of UFC fighters and some other cagefighters that are studying Jeet Kune Do to give them an advantage and it is working in their favour.

What would be your top training tip?

Keep it simple, keep it direct and keep it non-classical. If it's fussy, then it is fussy, it's going to take too long for you to do what you've got to do.

I'm not so sure that the very skills which make James Toney so special in the squared circle – the shoulder rolls, the parrying, the bending at the knees and slipping shots by a

matter of inches — won't just play into the hands of a wrestler like Randy. Toney can knock Randy out, no question, but I think Randy is too smart to give him that chance.

WAD ALAMEDDINE MMA FIGHTER MANAGER

I definitely think
this fight should be
happening, to me a
farce is a fight like
Butterbean vs Genki
Sudo. This fight is
nothing like that. Both
guys are a similar
weight, both are skilled and
respected in their own sport
and own right. I'm actually
leaning towards a James
Toney victory in the first
round.
